If you went away hungry Tuesday night, you just didn't return to the table enough times, as food was plentiful and delicious!

The show and tell table was full of very interesting items and folks milled around admiringly throughout the evening. Buddy suggested that the carvers bring their work back once more to the February meeting where each piece can be discussed. But these are the things I observed ... a huge moose horn with moose carved into it in a very detailed manner, by **Johnny Dunlap**. He had also brought his lovely carved lady with the tiny, delicate roses on her dress and in her hand, and her handsome gentleman friend, both of which were excellently carved, and then painted by his wife. Jake Heugel had three items which he had carved and then creatively mounted on bases with brass plaques naming each piece. His carved ram was entitled "Mountain Majesty", the mountain lion was entitled "Intimidator", and the bob cat was entitled "Stalking Her Prey". Pretty clever, Jake, and realistically carved I might add. **Buddy Streetman** had carved another pair of those tiny shoes, this time for a

golfer. He had also completed his impressive stylized dolphin carved from walnut. **Diann Small** shared the lovely stylized heart which won first place at the Fredericksburg show last September, a Santa she had carved in the "tramp"method which we want to hear more about, and she also brought her carved walking stick which was so impressive. Then there was **Jim Roby's** caricature cowboy ... as always a great carving with the "Roby" touch. REESE's PIECES for the NOVICE By Bob Reese

This hint is for bases of your carvings. On some of my Cowboy carvings, I like to make the base with wooden slats. It looks like he is standing on an old wooden floor. I use a medium large V-Tool and then a sharp cut down the middle of the V. You can use Driftwood Grey and a little light brown (diluted) between the slats to give depth and to give the illusion of shadows. Don't forget to use a fine or medium point Marks-a-Lot for the nails.
