CINDERELLA'S CARRIAGE MUSIC BOX

Fantasy engulfs you as your eyes play over the delicate carriage and prancing horses. You are transported to the child's world of fairy godmothers, magic spells and glass slippers.

The wheels turn, the horses' legs move back and forth and the music box that serves as a power source, well – plays music!

A project some two years in periodic planning and design finally came to fruition, by no coincidence, to coincide with my 70th birthday. That's right! A birthday present to myself.



The base is carved from a 2" x 6" x 20" piece of redwood. Horizontal holes were drilled near each end. Turning the board on edge, the band saw dispatched the waste areas, and the balance of the shape was carved and sanded by hand.

The pumpkin is a turned hollow lidded box made from mulberry to accommodate the music mechanism and belt drives. The exterior was indexed and grooved to the shape of a pumpkin. The lid is turned and carved to look like the pumpkin stem and provides access to the music box and belt drives. Windows were drilled and power carved, along with slots in the bottom to accommodate the belt drives.

A turned double sheave is attached to the music box peg drum. VCR belts were used to power the front and rear wheels that have heart shaped spokes. The front axle serves as an intermediate shaft to power the turned mesquite eccentrics attached to the front shaft. The eccentrics are attached by small brass rods to a "single tree" swivel behind the horses. Similar brass rods are utilized in making the horse's legs move in proper sequence by crossing the rods under the horses.

The horses were hand carved from basswood with the legs carved separately. Brass pins attach the legs to the body of the horse so that they can swivel back and forth. My wife, "Gene", made the fringed covers for the horses and the window in the pumpkin.

The rear lights are turned and acrylic rod was polished and inserted for the light lens. The brass rings on the lights were brass tubing connections. The right rear light was attached to the music box winding key stem to serve as the winding mechanism.

All accessories, finials, carriage frame, wagon tongue, and other parts are turned from mesquite that originally came from my grandfather's farm in west Texas. I think he would have been amused.

REESE'S PIECES for the NOVICE

After I have used the linseed oil on my carving to put a final finish on it, I like to re-burnish the fuzzies. It seems as if they are easier to push back into crevices and gives the carving a more professional look. I use a bamboo chinese chop stick with one end pointed and the other end cut with a flat surface about 1/4" long. Make it like a thin flat head screwdriver.

Blank of the Month: Dian Small supplied the blank of the month, which was a unique heart.


The meeting was adjourned and carving began on the Blank of the Month.
