Dan's summary comments:

- I sat up a small 2' x 4' table with a selection of different types of wood carving (Relief, Chip carving, Caricature carving, stylized carving, Cottonwood bark, Architectural carving, etc.). I also include a carving project sequence showing the steps from a band saw blank through the stages of carving leading to a finished painted carving. This seemed to be a very successful set of carvings. Many comments about the various pieces. Different pieces sparked different people's interest.
- There was a good crowd that I would estimate at 30-40 people most of the afternoon. Most had purchased a beer so they tended to stay for a while. After touring the vendor tables many of the attendees chatted with groups of friends who happened to meet at the event.
- There were multiple vendors with similar or closely related offerings (e.g. Sawmills, instruction, collaboration, professional wood workers). We were the only woodcarving group.
- Several people expressed interest in woodcarving. Many had just attempted to start wood carving and others were just thinking they would like to try it. A good handful expressed serious interest and asked good, specific questions.

Suggestions:

• I think this was a worthwhile event for our club. It would be hard for us to brush elbows with this many people in one afternoon (remember there was no cost to the club). I estimate we distributed at least 30 club business cards.

• I brought my carving tools but I left them in the truck. With just a 2' x 4' table there was not enough room to display carvings and tools. Plus I was busy discussing carvings and the carving process. It would be hard for one person to watch over tools and carvings. However, several people had specific questions about tools. I would have been very good to have a sampling of tools to help explain techniques and tool related topics. • I suggest we have at least two people man a table if we do this again. It would provide a break to allow each to circulate and view other vendors in more detail.

• I think it would be a good idea to have a small 5x7 card sized form to collect information in what someone is interested in. After talking to several people things run together if you don't get something in writing. This could also provide a way of following up when that is appropriate.

• Several vendors had a signup sheet to collect attendees contact info (At least name and email) to subscribe to a vendor's newsletter. We should do that.

• Several vendors gave away "bling" like hats, tee shirts, notepads, small clipboard, stickers, color pamphlets, etc. We might consider that. We also my consider having a PC with a slideshow of completed carving. I don't know how many electrical outlets this venue had.
